
# 32<sup>nd</sup> Annual Juneteenth Freedom Festival

# What & Why is Juneteenth?

he simple answer is that Juneteenth celebrates the end of slavery by remembering June 19, 1865, when a Union General landed in Galveston, Texas, and issued his own version of the Emancipation Proclamation.

But there is a lot more to it than that. Slavery is a painful but important part of American history. And Juneteenth is a time to reflect on where we've been and how far we still have to go.

# **Emancipation Proclamation**

anuary 1, 1863, President Lincoln issued The Emancipation Proclamation, declaring that all slaves in the rebellious states were free. It was a military strategy to create more unrest in the rebellious southern states. Lincoln proclaimed the freedom of only those slaves held in the Confederacy, which did not recognize his authority. That meant it did not apply at all to slaves in states like Kentucky, which were slave states but had never joined the Confederacy.

### First Juneteenth

he Civil War continued for two more years afer the Emancipation Proclamation. The South surrendered in April, 1865, and the Union Army began its occupation of the rebel states.

On June 19, 1865, a Union General landed in Galveston, Texas. He saw people still enslaved and re-issued Lincoln's Proclamation.

Freed slaves in Texas first celebrated June 19th as "Freedom Day" and June 19th soon became "Juneteenth." Juneteenth is now a state holiday in Texas and celebrated across the coutry. Cincinnati's annual Festival began in 1988.
